**Description:** Raising awareness related to diagnosis, evaluation, and treatment referrals based on a lack of cultural inclusion surround Black males who exhibit aggressions and apathy is the necessary first step to addressing disparities. Viewing apathy as a defense mechanism encourages social workers to strengthen their assessments and challenge outcomes. It allows for a deeper understanding of how trauma experiences can manifest into aggression and apathy based on cultural norms and environmental factors that have not been evaluated. Through cultural competence and inclusion of cultural differences, social workers can lead changes in the fields of mental health and social support, make court referrals for treatment options instead of confinement, and develop more effective assessments and treatment interventions that have a direct impact on individuals, families, and communities.

**Description:** This workshop introduces the Safe and Together Model approach to child welfare cases involving intimate partner violence. Day One explores domestic violence as defined by Ohio law and looks at its dynamics and impact on family members. The day also examines the relevance of domestic violence to child welfare and provides an overview of identifying signs of domestic violence and assessing survivor strengths as well as Multiple Pathways to Harm for children. Day Two focuses on domestic violence-informed interviewing and the unique skill sets needed to interview perpetrators, adult survivors, and child survivors and create effective safety plans. The Model emphasizes community partnerships with local service providers, domestic violence advocates, law enforcement, and courts and provides an overview of Ohio mandates for certain professionals and community resources for victims such as protection orders.

If you want to learn about IEP's (Individual Education Plans) for children with disabilities, this is the training for you. If you complete the training and are appointed as the Surrogate Parent for your CASA child, you will be eligible to help make educational decisions for your CASA kids. If you complete the training and never want to serve as a Surrogate Parent under the statute, that is fine; just say no if you are ever called and asked to serve.

Factors that discourage and enable disclosure will be presented and best practice recommendations for addressing delayed disclosure will be discussed.

**Description:** This video will walk the participant through a family's journey when the subject of a suspected child abuse, neglect, or dependency report to an Ohio Public Children Services Agency (PCSA). Although there may be some variation in application among counties, all Ohio PCSA caseworkers utilize the same tools and processes for decision-making. The presenters will examine each of those tools, their purposes, the factors a caseworker must take into consideration, and how assessments guide decision-making. Understanding these processes can help the CASA volunteer and attorney guardian ad litem identify and collaboratively secure appropriate services and protections for the child they represent.

Part 1 begins with a look at the first two stages of intervention in Ohio's child welfare system, Intake and Assessment. As the family and caseworker move from the screening of a report to case decision, the video will examine the various decision points and assessments that are conducted to inform the caseworker's decision, as well as the pieces that the caseworker must put in place to protect and guide the child to permanency. This includes a high-level understanding of risk, safety and family assessments, case decisions, and placement options.

Part 2 looks at the third stage of Ohio's child welfare system, case management. This video dissects the elements of a quality case plan and helps the viewer to better understand how the language of the plan affects the family's ability to successfully modify behavior and address the concerns that led to protective intervention. As a CASA volunteer or attorney guardian ad litem you can advocate for families to be engaged in the development of case plans that are written clearly with observable measures and actions that directly link to the identified concerns.

**Description:** Research and experience tells us that many, if not most, cases that are referred to guardians ad litem (GAL) contain domestic violence as a significant component in the family dynamics. Domestic violence patterns that impact child and family functioning can be outside the scope of the legal definition of domestic violence (R.C. 2919.25 or 3113.31). Whether domestic violence is the precipitating cause for the referral to a GAL or is part of a family’s history, the full range of facts surrounding domestic violence must be considered in making recommendations relative to children’s best interests. Interviewing family members, reviewing court documents, and writing reports requires knowledge of the non-offending parent’s action to protect the children as well as the perpetrator’s patterns of behaviors and their impact on child and family functioning to inform appropriate intervention strategies. In this course, GALs will gain critical knowledge and skills to recognize the nuances in domestic violence dynamics and implement practices to foster children’s safety and well-being.
