Collaboration Approach

I leverage my background in education to build strong relationships with school principals, teachers, and counselors. Additionally, I work closely with Children Services caseworkers and maintain regular communication with the children's caregivers, whether they're parents, grandparents, or foster parents. I make it a priority to visit the children in their homes to better understand their living situations and needs.



Most Impactful Experience

One of my most meaningful experiences was mentoring a 17year-old girl who, upon turning 18, requested emancipation during a court hearing. Despite her struggles with academics, behavior issues at school, conflicts with her foster mother, and just recently securing her first job at a daycare, I witnessed something remarkable at her hearing. The confidence in her voice and the smile that spread across her face when the magistrate granted her emancipation told me everything I needed to know—she was going to make it, despite my earlier doubts.

Advice for Prospective CASA Volunteers

The role of a CASA volunteer can be as time-consuming, challenging, and rewarding as you want it to be. It all depends on your level of commitment. The three most important qualities for success are patience, resilience, and flexibility.
