A new working paper from the Early Childhood Scientific Council on Equity and the Environment (ECSCEE) explores the many ways that stability—or the lack of it—can shape children's developmental environments, with profound impacts on their health and well-being in the moment and across the lifespan. The paper, From Resources to Routines: The Importance of Stability in the Developmental Environment, brings together a broad array of evidence to show that stability is essential to healthy development and that promoting stability across the web of influences in young children's lives—from caregiver relationships to immigration to housing and food security—offers a vital opportunity to support both children and their caregivers.

Description: Throughout history, child and animal control workers have been intertwined. The first case of child abuse and neglect in the United States was filed in the court system by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in 1874. Today, Humane Agents are given legal rights under the law to protect children by being mandated reporters of child abuse and neglect. In 2021, Ohio passed House Bill 33 which made Child Welfare Workers and others Mandated Reporters of animal cruelty. This workshop is designed to make child welfare workers aware of the roles and responsibilities of child welfare, humane agents, and/or dog wardens. Workers will learn how reports are made to these agencies. Also, a discussion will take place about dog bites, Dangerous and vicious animals, Dog fighting, Domestic violence and how this is considered family violence when animals are involved. Knowing the signs of child and animal abuse along with the characteristics of children and animals living in these homes is essential for any worker. This course will focus on Federal and state laws pertaining to animal cruelty. House Bill 33 will be discussed along with how workers can meet their new mandates. Discussions will occur about CAPMIS and SACWIS about assessing for safety as well as reporting and documenting in SACWIS. Finally, workers' safety will be paramount in discussing this topic.

Description: This video will walk the participant through a family's journey when the subject of a suspected child abuse, neglect, or dependency report to an Ohio Public Children Services Agency (PCSA). Although there may be some variation in application among counties, all Ohio PCSA caseworkers utilize the same tools and processes for decision-making. The presenters will examine each of those tools, their purposes, the factors a caseworker must take into consideration, and how assessments guide decision-making. Understanding these processes can help the CASA volunteer and attorney guardian ad litem identify and collaboratively secure appropriate services and protections for the child they represent.

Part 1 begins with a look at the first two stages of intervention in Ohio's child welfare system, Intake and Assessment. As the family and caseworker move from the screening of a report to case decision, the video will examine the various decision points and assessments that are conducted to inform the caseworker's decision, as well as the pieces that the caseworker must put in place to protect and guide the child to permanency. This includes a high-level understanding of risk, safety and family assessments, case decisions, and placement options.

Part 2 looks at the third stage of Ohio's child welfare system, case management. This video dissects the elements of a quality case plan and helps the viewer to better understand how the language of the plan affects the family's ability to successfully modify behavior and address the concerns that led to protective intervention. As a CASA volunteer or attorney guardian ad litem you can advocate for families to be engaged in the development of case plans that are written clearly with observable measures and actions that directly link to the identified concerns.

Host Sally Pfitzer is once again joined by Center Director Dr. Jack Shonkoff as they dive into the different types of stress, including what makes certain stress "toxic," while other stress can be tolerable or even positive for children. They discuss the effects that toxic stress can have on developing brains, as well as what it means to be resilient to sources of stress, and how parents and caregivers can help encourage that resilience in children. Dr. Shonkoff also emphasizes the point that, even for those who may have experienced toxic stress, "it's never too late to make things better." Then, listen to a panel discussion featuring Pediatrician Dr. Kathleen Conroy, Community Mental Health Worker Cerella Craig, Professor and Researcher Dr. Megan Gunnar, and Training Director for Rise Magazine Jeanette Vega, as they discuss the various ways in which they encounter toxic stress and its effects in their work. The panelists speak openly about how toxic stress can affect families and children—including ways in which the systems set up to help can be the cause of further stress—and how to talk about toxic stress in a way that doesn't make things feel hopeless to those who have experienced it. They also dig into strategies they employ in their various fields to help children and families deal with stress, and move what might be toxic stress back to tolerable levels.

eligible to help make educational decisions for your CASA kids. If you complete the training and never want to serve as a Surrogate Parent under the statute, that is fine; just say no if you are ever called and asked to serve.
